In the span of 10 days in May, I had the good fortune to be in the company of the most senior Jewish grad and the most junior Jewish grads serving in our Army. There's no question that the Army Jewish community is in good

The senior Jewish grad is Maj. Gen. Dave Gardner '94. On May 30th, Dave assumed command of the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault) at Ft. Campbell, Kentucky. What a thrill for me to be there! As a Jewish grad myself, I was filled with nachas. Dave is proudly Jewish, and he and his wife Evee told me of taking a picture of the mezuzah that is now affixed to the doorpost of the commanding general's quarters at Ft. Campell. Just today, as I write this, the Jewish chaplain at Ft. Bragg told me of Dave helping to erect the sukkah there this past fall during his prior assignment. And as

a former 101st Screaming Eagle (Rakkasan!), I couldn't have been prouder to watch Dave take the salutes of his commanders during the pass in review and to know that the division is in such capable hands. Mazel tov and Air Assault!

The week before, I attended the baccalaureate service at the chapel for the class of 2025. We have 18 new Jewish second lieutenants (seventeen in the Army and one in the Air Force). Eighteen chai, indeed an auspicious number—kol hakavod, 2025! Those new lieutenants are an impressive and inspiring group of young officers. As a West Point graduate, I'm immensely proud. Although West Point will rightly claim the credit for their 47-month journey that will no doubt result in their success as Army (and Air Force) officers, our Jewish chapel and its programs, which the Fund supports, were a big part of that journey for many of them. As a Jewish graduate, I'm immensely proud of that as well. Mazel tov and welcome to the Long Gray Line!

I'm an old grad, so the compulsion to impart advice to younger grads comes naturally. I'm not going to resist that urge now. So, to the Jewish grads of the class of 2025, and to all Jewish grads still serving in our great Army, here it is: Be like Dave Gardner. Be proudly Jewish; put up a mezuzah. And be involved with the Jewish community on your post. You don't have to volunteer to be the lay leader, but reach out to the Jewish chaplain or lay leader to let them know you support them. Most important, show up. Help put up the sukkah. The Army Jewish community needs you and your leadership. Who better than West Pointers to lead the Army Jewish community?

We have a couple of transitions on our board. Our immediate past chairman, Maj. Gen. (Ret.) Bob Rosenkranz '61, has transitioned to director emeritus status. The Fund thanks Bob for his devoted service to and leadership of the Fund for many, many years. He made a huge difference. A job well done, sir.

All of us are greatly saddened by the passing of Col. (Ret.) Pete Gleichenhaus '61. He was a longtime member of the board who never missed a meeting or turned away an opportunity to volunteer. Pete was the lay leader at West Point when I was a first classman. He was a mentor to me then, and he continued that mentorship even after I became chairman of the Fund's board. I already miss his phone calls, which invariably began with "Jeffrey!" and invariably proceeded to leave me with something (or two or three things) to think about. May his memory be a blessing. Be thou at peace, sir.

Two long years after the flooding at West Point, I'm happy to report that repairs to the chapel are underway in earnest. Unfortunately, those repairs mean that the chapel will not be open to welcome the class of 2029 and their parents this month, but it will be back up and running at full speed for the academic year. Please come visit.

Our chapel and its programs for our Jewish cadets would not exist without your continued support. Thank you for that support and for being part of the West Point Jewish community.

What does holiness mean to you? What does it mean to be holy?

During our last Shabbat service of the semester here at West Point, our Torah portion was most appropriate for our timing. The Torah portion was *K'doshim*, which comes from the Hebrew word *kadosh*. In Hebrew, *kadosh* translates as "set apart" or "separated." It signifies a state of being distinct from the ordinary, the profane, or the common. The concept of "holy" doesn't necessary imply perfection or one who does not make mistakes, but rather one who is dedicated to God or to something higher than oneself.

The Torah portion states, "The Eternal spoke to Moses, saying, 'Speak to the whole Israelite community and say to them, 'You shall be holy, for I, the Eternal your God, am holy." So, what makes us holy? Is it, as Rabbi Dvora Weisberg

asks in her *D'var Torah*, honoring ones' parents? It is observing the sabbath? Or is it leaving the produce on the edges of our fields for the poor. Does keeping kosher, giving *tzedakah*, visiting the sick, or returning extra change mistakenly given to us make us holy?

In addition to thinking about what actions make us holy, the Chatam Sofer (the preeminent leader of Judaism in the Austro-Hungarian Empire during the first part of the 19th century), teaches that only through the power of the collective can the individual be holy; not through one's power alone. Judaism calls on us to seek holiness in community. This is embodied through so many of the rituals that we have in Judaism: The ability to recite certain prayers with a *minyan* (10 or more Jews), enjoying a Passover Seder with family and friends, inviting others to eat in the sukkah, sitting *shiva* and caring for others during a time of mourning, rejoicing with a couple at their wedding, or celebrating a new life are just a few of the things in which we need and want community to share.

As we discussed what holiness meant to each person during our last Shabbat service of the semester, our Cadets shared an array of thoughts about what it meant to them. For some, they believed that community is needed to create this holiness that the Torah talks about. It was also shared that it keeps us accountable for what we do. For others, they believed that while community is important, one can indeed achieve holiness on an individual level. Finally, some Cadets agreed that holiness can happen both individually and within the community.

As Rabbi Weisberg shared in her *D'var Torah*, each of us as the capacity for holiness. And when we see ourselves as members of the Jewish community, as "*Am Yisrael*" (the people of Israel), we realize that we are in this together, through the joyful times, and through the challenging times. Being holy does not mean being perfect, but we can better each other as we strive for this holiness to which God calls us.

As I stood there listening to each Cadet share what they believed holiness exemplified, I felt the very "holiness" that they were sharing about so passionately. It was truly a moment of kedusha (holiness). This is one of the very special things that separate us from the rest of the community. Our Cadets have come together every week, every holiday, every special occasion, and have created this very sacred place. I am honored to be a part of this remarkable community that our West Point Jewish community has created.

So, what does holiness mean to you?

CADET AND COMMUNITY OWNERSHIP: SHABBAT SERVICES & TORAH STUDY

n all my years with Jewish communities and even more so with the West Point Jewish community (and this is a lot of years!), I have never seen such an engaged group of Cadets. Rabbi Heather Borshof along with our Cadet leadership team

across Hillel and the Jewish Choir have enabled and empowered our Cadets to integrate into services and Torah study in such a way that they have a vested ownership in these weekly events. This is so exciting to see! Over this past year, during weekly Shabbat services, you would often find Cadet Blake Schryer '25 and Cadet Angelique Arfa '28 helping to


lead services with their amazing voices adding so much ruach (רוּתַ)! Every d'var Torah felt more like a Torah study in the middle of Shabbat services. Rabbi Borshof would cultivate a meaningful message which started with numerous Cadets and community members reading a paragraph each to initiate discussion. Then, she would ask a wonderfully crafted, open-ended question to enable meaningful reflection. From there, Cadets routinely jumped in by answering questions like "What resonates with you?" "What do you agree with?" and "What do you disagree with?" In fact, at least once near the end of the Spring semester, Rabbi Borshof asked one question, and the Cadets rapidly engaged in a 15-minute discussion which culminated in tying in foundational Halachic concepts and pride to serve our Nation. Our Cadets are absolutely wonderful! We have had

a variety of Cadets (including Adam Nichols '25 and Samuel Gordon '27) lead their own d'var Torah. We have also had Cadets (including Ellie Davis '25, Olivia Raykhman '25, and Angeliqu Arft '28) lead the entirety of Shabbat services. Amazing! Services conclude with the entire community joyously singing a closing song led by our Cadets and then the singing continues in the social hall as they break into song and lead the Kiddush.

But wait ... there is even more amazement to share!! Weekly Torah studies have grown in a way that is so very wholesome! Each week during the academic year, we have Torah study on Tuesday during lunch. Rabbi Borshof runs the Torah study program masterfully and finds ways to incorporate wonderful scholars, educators, and leaders from

This is especially important for those athletes and others who have competing events pulling them from attending Shabbat services.

We look forward to welcoming our wonderful Cadets and community for Shabbat services and Academic Year 26 Torah Study and we truly appreciate the Fund's support.

n the weekend of 6 to 9 March 2025, fifteen Cadets and two faculty members from West Point participated in the 18th Annual Aleph Institute Military Symposium in Surfside, Florida. Participants from the full joint community came together at

the Shul (an Orthodox Synagogue) for faith, fellowship, and training focused on providing support to our Soldiers and Jewish communities wherever deployed or stationed. The theme for the conference addressed resilience, readiness, and moral clarity within crisis. Guest speakers included Chaplain (Maj Gen) Trent Davis (USAF, Chief of Chaplains), Chaplain (Brig Gen) Jack Stumme (US Army Deputy Chief of Chaplains), Maj Gen Borys Krementskyi (Ukrainian Air Force, Defense Attache



BETHOU AT PEACE:

REMEMBERING PETE GLEICHENHAUS, CLASS OF 1961

ol. D. Peter Gleichenhaus, or "Col. Pete," as friends liked to call him, lived a life devoted to service, both in his nearly 30-year career in the U.S. Army and in his role as a Jewish community leader.

Gleichenhaus died on Dec. 25 in San Francisco. He was 85. The cause of death was complications after a fall he took while playing tennis, according to his adult children.

"The first night of Hanukkah is the night he passed, surrounded by his family," son Army Col. Joseph Gleichenhaus told J.

A memorial service was held at Congregation Am Tikvah in San Francisco on Jan. 3, followed by graveside burial with U.S. military honors at Salem Memorial Park in Colma.

"Peter was a generous, compassionate leader — husband, father, brother,

coach, congregant, and friend," Rebecca Goodman, director of Jewish community engagement for the Jewish Community Relations Council Bay Area, wrote in a Dec. 30 email. Gleichenhaus served on the JCRC board from 2019 until the time of his death. In 2018, he received JCRC's Lifetime Distinguished Leadership Award after having led the organization's "Hiring Our Heroes" project to match returning Bay Area veterans with jobs.

On a memorial site, dozens of people shared fond memories of Gleichenhaus, including one lauding him as "a decisive leader and a mensch."

"Pete was an exceptional leader and a remarkable human being," Rabbi Doug Kahn, executive director emeritus of JCRC, wrote on the site. "When we worked together on a program to engage the Jewish community on behalf of veterans, Pete said it's about "jobs, jobs, jobs" and then he approached the S.F. Giants and the next thing I know we have a major jobs fair for veterans."

Born on Jan. 29, 1939, Gleichenhaus grew up in the Bronx in New York City. After graduating high school at 16, he



attended Blair Academy and Cornell University, eventually leaving Cornell to attend his dream school, the United States Military Academy at West Point. He graduated from West Point in 1961 and later earned a master's degree in physical education at the University of Wisconsin.

Gleichenhaus' three-decade Army service included two combat tours in Vietnam, first with the infantry and later in the artillery, according to family. He was highly decorated, earning three Bronze Star Medals, five combat Air Medals, two Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Crosses, a Combat Infantryman Badge and an Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal. He was stationed overseas in Panama and in Germany. He also spent several years at the Pentagon and had two assignments in the physical education department at West Point.

In 1985 he came to San Francisco, where he was assigned as deputy post commander and, later, inspector general at Sixth Army headquarters at the Presidio.

After retiring from the Army in 1990, Gleichenhaus worked in various jobs. He managed a medical group, had a short stint at a Silicon Valley startup, and served as dean at a business college in San Francisco. In 2001 he became the director of public works in Daly City, where he worked until he retired six years later.

Gleichenhaus and his wife, Barbara, were married 61 years and raised

three children together. They had four grandchildren.

Gleichenhaus's son told J. his dad led with generosity and knew how to make people feel seen and special.

"He had that unique ability, you were the only two there if he was engaging with you," he said.

In a 2018 JCRC video that accompanied the leadership award, Joseph

> Gleichenhaus described his father as a "morning person" who made productivity part of every day.

> "That's how he operated. When you get things done you get them done quick, you come back, and you find you have lots more time to do a whole bunch of things," he said, noting his father's "extreme patience and amiability."

Gleichenhaus' eldest daughter, Wendy Veneris, spoke in the same video of her dad's devotion to family, describing him as "honest and humble."

"He always impressed upon us: If you are able to do something for your family, you do. If you can show up, you do," she said.

Gleichenhaus was the president of San Francisco Congregation B'nai Emunah before it merged with Beth Israel Judea to become Am Tikvah. He served as chairman of Goodwill Industries and on the boards of the Bay Area Council of the Boys Scouts of America, the Lake Merced Golf Club, Interfaith Center at the Presidio, the Korean War Memorial Foundation, the JCRC and the West Point Jewish Chapel Fund. He was involved in numerous other projects and organizations.

"He was genuine and authentic and he saw the best in everyone," Morissa Gleichenhaus, his youngest child, told J. "He never said a bad word about anybody. He sought out what made people spark and he would help enhance that. That's what he did all the time. He focused on the positive."
